### High court tosses \$3.4M award to child porn victim

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court today said a federal law limits how much money victims of child pornography can recover from people who viewed their images online, throwing out a nearly \$3.4 million judgment in favor of a victim. Two dissenting justices called on Congress to change the law to benefit victims.

The justices said in a 5-4 ruling that courts can order people convicted of child pornography to pay restitution to their victims, but only to the extent that there is a strong tie between the victim's losses and the convicts' actions.

# Moving, learning

Coach visits Kennedy to get kids active

Educators say elementary school students struggle to pay attention for eight hours, five days a week without small breaks throughout the day to wiggle around and burn off excess energy.

The statewide program Move to Learn, co-created by the Mississippi Department of Education and The Bower Foundation, focuses on getting children from pre-kindergarten to sixth grade to exercise in small "brain breaks," as Kennedy Early Childhood Center principal Katrina Hines calls them.

Superintendent Dr. Cedrick Ellis, who was moving alongside the majority of Kennedy's children Tuesday morning at a live presenta-

tion from the program's organizers, said Move to Learn is being utilized at Kennedy and Otken Elementary daily.

Hines said her campus is engulfed in exercise every morning from 8:05 to 8:15 a.m. right before classes start for the day. Music plays in the hallways, and students and teachers dance around, burning off energy while giving them more brain energy.

"Doing that movement gets oxygen to their brain, and then they have more cognitive ability to learn," said Anne Travis, CEO of The Bower Foundation. "Research shows when we oxygenate our brains, it helps with learning and it helps with behavior issues, too."

## Johnson expresses concerns over city measures

Selectman, facing primary re-election challenge, gives views on pay raises, motel tax proceeds

Selectman Melvin Joe Johnson, the sole incumbent on the ballot in McComb's May 6 primaries, was more vocal than usual Tuesday at the last city board meeting before balloting.

Johnson opened the meeting with comments, saying the next city board — whether he's on it or not — should give city employees pay raises during the budget-writing process this summer. He has been advocating for 6 percent raises since December.

Johnson also asked that the hotel/motel tax, renewed this year by the state Legislature for the next four years, be used to repair the Martin Luther King gymnasium in Burglund.

"I would recommend that we do what we stated at the beginning of this administration," Johnson said, referring to unsuccessful proposals to fix the condemned structure. "With the ho-

tel/motel tax, I mentioned, 'Let's do something about the gym,' but most of the board agreed to finish the sports park first. Now, we've performed our duty at the sports park."

Johnson could not be reached for further comment this morning.

He went on to vote against three different measures.

## Board fires Magnolia detective

The Magnolia Police Department's second-in-command, Capt. James Kenny, was relieved of his duties Tuesday after town aldermen voted unanimously to fire him.

The move comes a month after Kenny was convicted in Pike County Court on a misdemeanor charge of violating a domestic abuse protection order.

The board met at 5:30 p.m., continuing talks in executive session that were initiated earlier this month and recessed after aldermen failed to come to an agreement.

The second session, however, proved quick and decisive, as the board spent only about 30 minutes in closed session, then emerged with Alderman Lonnie Cox moving to terminate Kenny. Alderman Joe Cornacchione seconded the motion.

It passed unanimously, though Mayor Melvin Harris was absent, prompting Alderman-at-large Mercedes Ricks to fill in as mayor pro tem.

Police Chief Ray Reynolds accompanied the board into closed session, but Kenny did not attend the meeting at all.
